LOCAL LAW REPEALING AND REPLACING CHAPTER §410 OF THE TOWN CODE ENTITLED "NUISANCES"

Attorney VanWhy gave an overview of the proposal to potentially repeal and replace the current law regarding nuisances. Mr. VanWhy proposed that the town make changes to the lock down law that would give us a stronger law with a little more leverage with these potential properties. There is some review that Attorney VanWhy, Joel Kie, Steve Rafferty, and Supervisor Marinaccio need to go over. The goal is to go through and identify all the code violations correctly and note any particular concerns that the town may have.

Attorney VanWhy noted that he, Joel Kie, Steve Rafferty, and Supervisor Marinaccio will be working on a draft and hopes that within the next few months they will have a final draft for the board to consider.

AMENDING TOWN PARKING LAW REGARDING PARKING TOO CLOSE TO A FIRE HYDRANT

Attorney VanWhy introduced a potential Local Law that is being worked on to make it a violation under out vehicle and traffic law for parking under fifty feet from a fire hydrant. This amendment to the Town Code would make the obstruction of a fire hydrant a town code violation and would give us the ability to enforce it. It also allows us to do it on our short form parking ticket violation notice. When a parking ticket is issued, Joel, our Town Constable, will take down the license plate number, put a sticker on it, and write a ticket. The court will get a copy of the ticket, look up the registered owner of the vehicle, and mail out the notice to the offender.

Currently, the obstruction of a fire hydrant is a violation under our Town water code where a normal full notice of violation must be done, and an information complaint must be issued. Under the State vehicle and traffic law the only people that can issue a parking ticket for parking too close to a fire hydrant are police officers.

RESOLUTION 2022-39

Attorney VanWhy explained that this is the Chenango Fire Company's tax-exempt financing that ratifies the Supervisor's signature on a certificate that was provided that there was no issue from the town when it comes to their tax-exempt borrowing. This does not obligate the town to pay back the loan that the Fire Company is taking out. The Fire Company had a Public Hearing, and no one showed up.

 Public Works Commissioner Kie stated that the American Rescue Fund allocations need to be amended. The Town Hall had to be adjusted because the material prices increased from the original estimate that we obtained last fall.

- Supervisor Marinaccio reported that there was a meeting with our auditor/advisor Mike Giovinazzo to make sure that how the money has been held and spent are all done correctly. At budget time there will be some adjustments to Joel's budget.
- Public Works Commissioner Kie reported that all of the town was swept with the new street sweeper. The auction closed on the old street sweeper netting approximately \$16,000.

Attorney VanWhy received a notice from a solar developer with a question about taxes. Mr. VanWhy responded with a letter stating that the Town opted out of the RPTL-487 and the property is one hundred percent taxable.

Attorney VanWhy stated that New York State adopted a new valuation methodology for solar and wind specifically, and it is going to be based off the actual megawatts that are generated. Code Enforcement Officer Rafferty stated that he expects the estimate for the decommissioning will be put on the Planning Board Meeting agenda scheduled for September 26th.

Mr. Kie reported that Starbuck's should be open by October.
