

The Town continues to be busy from a legal perspective. I work closely on a regular basis with the Supervisor and members of the Town, Planning and Zoning Boards, Town Clerk, Commissioner of Public Works, Engineer, Code Enforcement and Dog Control Officers, Judges and Court Clerks on a wide array of matters.

Based on the research and analysis of the Public Works Commissioner and Town Engineer, Dickinson was one of the first municipalities in the County to pass a comprehensive road preservation local law. This law provides a method for the Town to track the use of its roads by heavier vehicles making frequent trips. The owners of such vehicles are required to obtain a permit to access the Town's roads and make arrangements to repair any damage they cause. Other municipalities in the Southern Tier have adopted similar local laws modeled on the one passed in Dickinson.

Another local law recently passed by the Town was aimed at controlling the abandonment of shopping carts on Town streets and sidewalks. The law provides for the Public Works Department to collect and return wayward shopping carts to their owners for a small handling fee, and dispose of unredeemed carts.

In an effort to maintain the highest standards of governance, the Town Board is in the process of updating its

Code of Ethics local law. Also, the Town Board adopted an anti-nepotism policy, as well as a resolution providing for increased public access to its records prior to its meetings and through the internet.

The Town has continued its aggressive stance with code enforcement matters. In the past year the Code Enforcement Department has focused on several structures with serious building code violations. Some of these properties were brought into compliance, while others were condemned. One structure was demolished, and others are in the process for condemnation and demolition. The Code Enforcement Officers have also continued to pursue smaller code violation matters, resulting in a very high compliance rate.

The Town continues to look for cost saving measures, including shared service agreements with other local municipalities for equipment and services. These measures were part of the reason that the Town was able to stay within the state mandated cap allowing no more than a 2% increase in the tax levy from the prior year.

As a resident of Dickinson, I take pride in the hard work our officials are putting into the Town's legal matters to improve the quality of life for all of us.

2012 Town of Dickinson Budget Highlights

- Total spending for 2012 has been reduced by 3% as compared to 2011, from \$3,590,00 in 2011 to \$3,511,000 for 2012

- Spending was reduced throughout all the departments but town services remain in place, such as brush pick up, leaf pickup, street cleaning, sidewalk program and others.

- The retirement contribution to New York State for 2012 has a 17% increase which the town has to pay as directed by the state. In 2010, there was an increase of 42% that we had to pay the state.

- We anticipate the cost of health insurance to rise again, at least 12% for 2012. While we have changed our policies over the years to save thousands of dollars in premium costs to the town, we continue to see increase in insurance costs every year. As a reminder, we eliminated health insurance benefits to most of our elected officials saving the tax payers almost \$100K per year. We also eliminated the health pool that saved the town additional funds.

- We continue to pay down our bonds/loans at a faster pace than what we originally borrowed at. The outstanding loans that the town has are for the town hall and the bonds to do flood mitigation work in Sunrise Terrace and Chenango Shores which we are paying off as quickly as possible. This original bond was for \$670,000 and will be down to \$167,000 and paid off in 2013.

- We continue to have an excellent rating from Moody's Financial due to our conservative spending, maintaining a healthy surplus and keeping taxes at a very reasonable rate.

- Sales tax revenue was capped by the county last year so we will not see much of an increase even with sales tax

revenue being up slightly this year. We budget the same revenue expectations for 2012 as we had for 2011 which is \$698,000.

- There was no increase in salary for the assessor, attorney, engineer, planning board and zoning board members, the town board, town supervisor, and the two judges, those salaries remain frozen. The town clerk and the town highway superintendent received an increase of 2%.

- The total property tax increase for 2012 will be 1.75%, .25 % below the tax cap. This was partly accomplished by reduced spending and by using some surplus funds. Though property tax rates in our town may vary a bit depending on what fire district they are in, the average tax rate for 2012 will be \$.66 cents per thousand for highway and \$1.38 per/1000 for general fund for a total of \$2.04 p/1000 of assessed valuation of property. A house assessed at \$80K will pay .05 cents more per thousand in 2012 or an average of \$163 per year.

- County property taxes: The County announced a 1.57% increase in property taxes for their 2012 budget. The Town of Dickinson, along with several other towns, will actually see a much higher increase in county tax rates due to some errors made by the county in 2011. Dickinson residents will see their county tax rate go to around \$11.06 p/1000 or around a 17% increase.

- Those residents who live in the Garbage District, mostly Prospect Terrace and Stella Ireland Rd. area, will actually see their cost for garbage hauling decreased due to a lower bid price and the use of some accumulated surplus funds that can only be used in that district.

The bottom line is that the Town of Dickinson remains one of the lowest taxed towns in Broome County while continuing to offer many great services that our residents expect from their town. We will continue to seek out ways of saving money through shared services, more efficient operations and increasing our tax base through new developments, both residential and commercial. Our staff is to be congratulated for their hard work and dedication to the town and its residents. Our town board continues to do a great job in maintaining our town in an efficient and effective manner while keeping our spending as low as possible. A special thanks to Bev Wike, our Executive Secretary and Bookkeeper who spends a great deal of time in the development of our budget and keeps all of us well informed each and every month on our spending and on other programs as well.

Town of Dickinson Adopts Anti Nepotism Law

Town of Dickinson, NY (WBNG Binghamton) The Town of Dickinson votes to make government, and the contractors working for it, more transparent. The town board approved a resolution to make sure nepotism is not behind contracts and hiring. The new policy forbids the town to hire a close relative of a town official or employee or to award a contract to the close relative of a town official or employee. The law does not apply to workers or contractors who are already employed by the town prior to this new legislation.

2011 Flood

This flood of historic proportions affected many towns, villages and the city of Binghamton causing hundreds of millions of dollars in damage. Many homes and businesses throughout the county were destroyed and many incurred thousands of dollars in damages. Some of our residents in the Town of Dickinson also suffered serious damage to their properties, especially in the Chenango Shores sub-division which is located just north of the Broome Community College. Following the floods of 2006, the town completed a flood mitigation project for Chenango Shores but there was no way to stop the Chenango River which began to over flow into Front St and the BCC Campus and then into Chenango Shores. The majority of the damages incurred were in basements but there were approximately 5 homes where the water rose high enough to enter into the first floor causing a great deal of damage and personal loss. During the flood, our public works staff, elected officials, Prospect Terrace Fire Company, Chenango Fire Company, County and State Emergency Services and neighbors worked very hard in assisting those who were affected by the flood waters. While it was heartbreaking to see homes severely damaged, it was heartwarming to watch how everyone worked together, including our residents, for many long hours and days, in an effort to save properties and belongings. At the February Town meeting, the Town Board awarded a contract to Rick Woitd, an engineer who specializes in flood protection, to perform a study to see if installing a flap gate on a 52" storm drain that is located behind the Regal Theater and travels under I-81 and into Otsinango Park and the Chenango River, would have any major flooding impacts on properties downstream from this storm pipe. At the conclusion of this study, a meeting will be called and an update will be given to the residents of Chenango Shores and Front St., BCC, Nimmonsburg Church and the commercial properties along Front St.

Flood Study

The Town Board has hired Design Engineer, Rick Woitd who designed the local flood walls which include those located at Lourdes Hospital, Union Endicott High School and United Health Services (UHS). We have called upon him to perform a flap gate study specific to Chenango Shores which includes Nimmonsburg Church, upper Front Street and Route 11. This study would also involve the area which crosses under Route 81 and Route 88. The Department of Transportation (DOT) is concerned to not make matters worse by installing a flap gate so this study is required before a flap gate is installed at the east end of a large storm drain which crosses under the I-81 Highway and empties into Otsinango Park. If the study proves that there will be no major affect of properties downstream from this storm drain, the Department of Transportation has committed to install and maintain the flap gate.

Sales Tax Distribution Issue

We are awaiting word from the County Executive and the County Legislators regarding the changing of the sales tax distribution formula back to the original 50/50 split amongst all municipalities. Rumor has it that the formula could change in December of this year and would be in place for the 2013. For the Town of Dickinson, this could mean an additional \$70,000 in revenue that would help fund both our highway and general funds. Broome County will maintain sales tax on clothing and with the higher gas prices and the increased spending on flood related items for businesses and home owners, sales tax revenue will increase in multi-millions of dollars.

Town Board Legislation

In 2011, the Town Board continued to pass important legislation. The following are just a few of the Resolutions passed by the Board:

2011-2: Approved Prospect Terrace Fire Company Agreement, 2011-3: Approved the Organizational Matters for Town Operations, 2011-4: Approved the Condemnation, Demolition of 50 N. Broad St., 2011-5: Approved Mandate relief due to Property Tax Cap, 2011-9: Approved the Installation of a

Generator at Broome Community College Pump Station (owned by the Town), Local Law #1-2011: Approved Road Preservation Law, 2011-12: Approved Request that Broome County Legislature revise the Sales Tax Sharing formula to 50/50 Split. The Town Board passed the Anti-Nepotism Law which dictates that no family members of current staff will be hired by the town. This includes Town Board, Town Court, and Highway staffing. The Town Board also passed a revised Code of Ethics Law that is much more detailed than the previous code.

Garbage District Bids: The lowest bid submitted for Garbage Service was from Waste Management. The service contract took effect on January 1, 2012 and will continue for 2 years when the contract will be once again up for bid.

Condemnation of Properties: The Town Board condemned and demolished a second vacant residence at 50 N. Broad St. In 2010, 231 Bevier St. was demolished. Another property located at 13 Bellaire St. has been taken over by the town, has been condemned and will be demolished later this year. These properties affected the value, health and safety of neighboring properties and were well beyond repair and rehabilitation. The Town is sending a message to those owners that neglect their properties, that we will not tolerate this behavior and will take action to force property owners to correct any and all deficiencies including demolition.

Broome Community College: The Town continues to have a wonderful working relationship with Broome Community College. The college and the town went into a shared service agreement where the town will use their Sweeper to clean the college's roads and parking lots. We have also worked with the college on several water line projects and we look forward to additional shared services in the future.

Glenwood Rd./ Meadow Woods Project: The Town was recently informed that the Meadow Woods residential project located just off of Glenwood Rd. as you head towards BOCES, is still alive. Phase 1 of this project was accepted by the Town Planning Board and unless there are revisions to Phase 1, the project can move forward. This development consists of single family homes built with very low maintenance built into the design and layout. This project will add to our property tax base, fire district, light, water and sewer districts as well.

Code Enforcement & Building Permits

The Code Enforcement Department expects 2012 to be a busy and productive year. The department expects work to start on a housing development on Glenwood Road that was approved several years ago and is currently reviewing the necessary procedures that need to be completed prior to the start of the construction phase of the project. The development will enable the Town of Dickinson to compete with other local municipalities in providing a new source of residential housing units that will enable the Town to continue to grow and prosper.

The Town will continue to proceed with the practice of taking action against owners of structures that have outlived their usefulness and creates a health and safety hazard to adjacent properties. The Town has been successful in demolishing several structures in the last two years that posed major risks to the neighborhoods where these structures once were located. The Town is currently working on two additional properties that

need to be demolished for the betterment of the Town of Dickinson. The Town of Dickinson is also actively involved in requesting the New York State Labor Department in waiving asbestos fees for properties demolished by the Town. These fees can add \$4,000.00 to the cost of demolition.

The Town is awaiting revised flood maps that are expected to be released this year. While the majority of the Town has been spared from the last three major flooding events in the last six years, there have been problem areas that need to be addressed. The Town is actively involved in the Broome County Flood Task Force Committee which was formed after the flooding events in 2005 and 2006.

The Town will continue to issue

violation notices to property owners that are in violation of local codes and ordinances. The majority of these violations are corrected once the owner is aware of the violation. Those cases that are not corrected are issued appearance tickets and are handled through the Town of Dickinson Justice Court. Every effort is made to handle these cases in a professional and

timely manner. The majority of cases involve unlicensed vehicles and property maintenance issues. In an effort to reduce complaints, please remember to place garbage cans at the curb the afternoon or evening preceding garbage collection day and remove cans from the curb the afternoon or evening the day of garbage collection.



Town Assessor

This year the Tentative Roll will be in the Town Hall the first part of May. Grievance Day this year will be May 23rd from 4:00 pm to 8:00 pm at the Town Hall. If you have any questions regarding your Assessment or Exemptions don't wait till the end of May to contact us. My regular office hours are Wednesday mornings or I'll be glad to meet you by appointment.

If for some reason you feel an error has been made in your Tax Bill either in the September School Tax or the January Town and County please contact us as soon as you get the bill. If an error has truly been made we have the ability to correct the Bill.

One area of confusion is the difference on the Tax Bill between Full Market Value and Assessed Value. Your taxes are based on the Assessed Value of your property. The Full Market Value is New York State using the assessed value and the current equalization rate to estimate a value. This is not an accurate method to estimate the current value of your property. The problem is that residences feel we have increased their assessment without informing them. Whenever we increase or decrease your assessment you will be notified in writing from our office.

As always any questions or concerns you may have please feel free to stop in and talk with us. If we don't have the answer we'll try to find it for you.

For those of you who do not know me here is a brief introduction to the new Town Clerk. I am Wanda Broczkowska, a native of the north side of Johnson City and currently residing on Orchard Road here in the Town of Dickinson with my husband Mark.

If you are wondering what does a Town Clerk do? Records are a basic tool of government administration. Every day is different. The Town Clerk records and prepares the minutes of the monthly regular meeting and work session. The clerk is the filer of marriage and death certificates along with dog licensing, Freedom of Information Law (FOIL) requests, collecting taxes and water bills, building permits and guidance to network with the respective zoning or planning board members. Accuracy is especially important as it creates the records which are essential for future archival and retrieval of records by appropriate use of technology. I am working with our town supervisor to include information of meeting minutes, meeting dates, holiday schedule and up-to-date fee schedules on our new town website.

During my short tenure here, I have introduced some changes to conserve time and money. We used to spend a considerable amount of time preparing the dog license notices by folding 8 1/2 x 11 pages, stuffing and sealing envelopes, not to mention we paid letter size postage rates which now is reduced to a postcard size. Much of our paper correspondence between board members has been eliminated and now is transferred via our new town Email and electronic filing system. I know it's quite an undertaking but in the future I have expectations to establish ways to electronically archive and scan old records we typically filed in cabinets, safes or the vault. Concurrently

Broome County and the State of New York is providing us information regarding future training to support the towns make the transition from paper to electronic records.



Property Tax Cap

As many of you are aware, New York State Legislators imposed a Property Tax Cap on all municipal governments and school districts not to exceed 2%. For the past 16 years, our town has only seen 2 very small property tax increases while at the same time maintaining a healthy fund balance which is used every year to help stabilize our tax rates, pay down debt and to cover any emergency work that may be required throughout the town. Our 2012 Budget came in at an increase of 1.75%, lower than the imposed tax cap. We continue to receive A+ rating from Moody's Investors Service. We work very closely with all our department heads and elected officials to develop our budgets and at the same time, preserve town services that our residents desire.



Please do not use plastic bags. Yard waste should be placed 12 hrs prior to pick up. If Monday falls on a holiday, pick up will be the next day. Thank you for helping keep our town clean and safe.

Water Department The water department will be replacing sanitary sewer on Rosedale Drive from Terrace to Ferndale. Due to the mild winter we expect to start this project by the end of March. This should take three

A Note From Your DCO

If your dog passes away, is relocated, or Change of Ownership, please be sure to notify the Town Clerk immediately! Your failure to notify the clerk of changes and not returning a corrected yearly reminder would result in an appearance ticket being issued.

Also please be sure to check your dog license renewal contact information for accuracy. If your telephone number or address is incorrect, and we are unable to contact you, your pet would be taken to the shelter where a fee would be assessed for your pet's stay. The town has invested in software and a computer for the dog control vehicle that would allow the DCO to look up

your contact information from your dog's license tag that should always be affixed to your dog's collar. Any person owning, harboring, walking or in charge of a dog should not allow your dog to defecate on public property or on any private property without immediately picking up the waste and disposing of it properly. There is a two dog limit law in the town per property.

The town also has a leash law where your dog should be on a leash when off of the owner's property. If you have an issue concerning a dog or if you want to report a missing dog, you can contact Greg Starley, Dog Control officer, at 648-0481, ext. 5.

Zoning Board of Appeals

This past year the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) were called together to review two variances in the Town of Dickinson. One for the construction of an addition to the rear of a residence that was over the set back limits and one to construct an addition and deck to a residence. Each request required the review and approval of the ZBA to be completed. Why might you consider an appeal to the ZBA? "A person may want to appeal to the ZBA for two basic reasons. First, they may disagree with a PERMIT decision the Code Enforcement Officer has made or an action the officer has taken. Second, the appealing party may believe that an exception (variance) to the Zoning Laws should be made for their property". When in doubt or any questions you should call the Code Enforcement Officer to see if you may require a Variance and a review by the ZBA.
